AAUW PROGRAM

Wednesday, February 15, 2012 - 7 PM Helping Haiti Heal

Blenda Smith, Ph.D., FNP, RN will be our keynote speaker. Dr. Smith plans to share her story about Haiti in pictures taken in the aftermath of Haiti's earthquake of January 2010. The pictures she will share were taken during her two work trips to Haiti during October, 2010 and November 2011. Some of the earthquake's destruction of downtown Port-au-Prince as well as rural areas. In addition we will see photos of work sites where rebuilding has occurred and pictures of children at the United Methodist School where work teams lived during their stay.

Dr. Smith is a balanced combination of education, knowledge, compassion, and action. She earned a Master's of Science in nursing from The State University of New York at Binghamton, and a Ph.D in Human Service Studies with concentrations in Curriculum Development and Program Evaluation from Cornell University. Dr. Smith holds the title of Professor Emeritus of the Decker School of Nursing, Binghamton University (SUNY). Currently, she is a part-time Nurse Practitioner at the Broome County Health Department's Sexually Transmitted Disease Clinic.

Community involvement is an important part of Dr. Smith's life. Volunteer in Mission (VIM) trips (Zimbabwe, Haiti twice, Louisiana twice for Katrina work, Guinea, local Binghamton flood work in 2006 and 2010); designed and presented numerous anti-racism workshops for churches and community; Peace with Justice Committee of the Broome County Council of Churches; and board member of the Samaritan Counseling Center are a few of her community involvements. Dr. Smith truly puts her talk into action.
